



### ANIMAL UPDATES



In 2022, the Little Rock Zoo continued to excel in providing top-tier animal care and husbandry. Our dedication to maintaining the highest standards was affirmed by our successful passing of the AZA inspection, reinforcing our status as Arkansas's only accredited zoo. This prestigious accreditation highlights our unwavering commitment to animal welfare and management, ensuring that our animals receive exceptional care and that our visitors enjoy enriching and educational experiences.

One of the year's most notable achievements was our participation in the Year of the Tiger campaign. We welcomed a male tiger to our Zoo, resulting in the successful breeding and birth of three female cubs, all mother-reared. This rare and significant event, guided by SSP recommendations, represents a major step forward in the conservation of this majestic species.

We also had to say goodbye to some of our beloved residents. Sekani, one of our gorillas, and her three-year-old son, Bukavu, moved to the Fort Worth Zoo. This move was part of a strategic plan to help Bukavu bond with another young male as he prepares to join a bachelor group in the coming years.

In addition to these changes, the Little Rock Zoo remained active in the SSP community by hosting the Orangutan SSP meeting and workshop. This event allowed us to contribute to the broader conversation on species conservation and management, emphasizing our ongoing commitment to these critical programs.

Through these efforts, the Little Rock Zoo continues to set a high standard in animal care, conservation, and education, ensuring a bright future for both our animal residents and our community.

**CONSERVATION PROJECTS** 

In 2022, the Little Rock Zoo made significant strides in conservation, solidifying our role as a leader in wildlife preservation and research. Here are some key highlights from the past year:

#### **COLLARED LIZARD PROJECT:**

We entered into a partnership with the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission(AGFC); The Arkansas Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit, University of Central Arkansas, and the University of Arkansas Fayetteville to support the conservation of eastern collared lizards. As part of this initiative, over 60 offspring hatched in 2022. Currently, 50 of these young lizards are overwintering in our Reptile Brumation Shed and are scheduled for release into the wild in 2023. This project is crucial for bolstering the wild population and maintaining the ecological balance in their native habitats.



#### **BLACK RHINO CONSERVATION:**

We collaborated with specialists from across the country, including the reproductive team from Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo led by Dr. Monica Stoops, to collect and bank black rhino semen. This successful effort is a critical step in the genetic management and conservation of this endangered species, ensuring we have the resources to support future breeding programs.

#### **CONSERVATION AND RESEARCH INITIATIVES:**

"Gorillas on the Line" Cell Phone Recycling Program: Now in its second year at the Zoo this program encourages visitors to recycle old cell phones. By reducing the demand for coltan, a mineral mined in gorilla habitats, we help protect these endangered primates and their environments. In 2022, we were able to collect and recycle 200 devices!

### SAFE (SAVING ANIMALS FROM EXTINCTION) PROGRAM:



The Little Rock Zoo is proud to be a founding member of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums' SAFE program. This initiative leverages resources across zoos to coordinate and enhance conservation efforts and educational outreach dedicated to saving endangered species. Our participation in SAFE underscores our commitment to collaborative conservation efforts and the protection of wildlife.

Through these projects and partnerships, the Little Rock Zoo continues to make a meaningful impact on wildlife conservation, demonstrating our commitment to preserving the natural world for future generations.



### FACILITY UPDATES

In 2022, the Little Rock Zoo undertook numerous facility improvements to enhance the visitor experience and ensure the highest standards of animal care and safety. These updates reflect our ongoing commitment to maintaining a world-class zoo for our community.

Key accomplishments for the year include:

- Boardwalk Replacement and Sealing: We completed the replacement of the wooden boardwalk near the Cheetah and Veldt exhibits and sealed all wooden walkways and handrails to ensure safety and durability.
- Veldt Drainage Project: This essential project, aimed at improving drainage in the Veldt area, began in 2022 and is scheduled for completion in early 2023.
- Membership Office Renovation: We initiated a significant renovation of our membership facilities in 2022, which will be completed in early 2023, enhancing the experience for our valued members.
- Pathway Lighting: New lighting along the main pathway was installed to improve visibility and safety at night, with the project expected to be finalized in 2023.
- **EV Chargers:** Four new electric vehicle chargers were installed in the front parking area, supporting our commitment to sustainability and providing a convenient service for our visitors.
- Collaborations with WD&D and PMI Engineering:
  We collaborated on several projects, including the
  Great Apes Department (GAD) HVAC system, which
  will be completed in 2023, and a storm water
  management project set to finish in 2023.
- New Exhibits and Upgrades: The new collared lizard exhibit and off-exhibit holdings were completed, alongside a new reptile brumation shed and various reptile exhibit upgrade, enhancing both visitor engagement and animal care.



### VETERINARY UPDATES

In 2022, the Little Rock Zoo's veterinary team achieved several significant milestones, underscoring our dedication to providing exceptional care for our animals and contributing to broader veterinary knowledge and practices.

- **Veterinary Internship Program:** This year, we launched a Veterinary Internship Program, aimed at training the next generation of veterinary professionals. This program not only enhances the educational landscape for aspiring veterinarians but also brings fresh perspectives and additional expertise to our team.
- Rhino Immobilization and Specialist Collaboration: We successfully planned and executed a rhino immobilization, a complex procedure that required meticulous preparation and coordination. Through this process, we established valuable relationships with specialists, enhancing our capacity to manage and care for our rhino population.
- **Diet Modifications for Great Apes:** Recognizing the importance of nutrition in animal health, we made significant modifications to the diets of our great apes. These changes are designed to create healthier, more balanced diets, improving the overall well-being of these intelligent and social animals.



## EDUCATION UPDATES

In 2022, the Little Rock Zoo's Conservation Education team underwent a significant transformation, reorganizing and refocusing to enhance our mission and better connect with the community. A key highlight was the launch of new early childhood programs, including Pop-Up Play sessions and Story Times, with 10 pilot events held between September and December. These initiatives engaged young audiences and their families, fostering a love for science and exploration.

Additionally, the team delivered nearly 15,000 guest engagement experiences in just four months through roving interpretation, front gate interactions, and awareness days, creating a more dynamic and enriching experience for Zoo visitors.
